As a result residents have to remain strong, resilient and connected. They have to support each other and also ensure they maintain a strong voice locally and nationally. PRIORITY	COASTAL ADAPTATION Managing and adapting to coastal erosion	TIMESCALE/PROGRESS FUNDING
REASONING	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Rising sea levels and more frequent storm surges cause erosion. A need to continue to build community resilience and engage with key partners and agencies. Ensure the community remains at the forefront of community-led activity. Support the community to adapt and manage the changing coast line. Of principal importance for biodiversity conservation. Sand dunes are on the Scottish priority biodiversity list of habitats requiring conservation and protection. The dunes play an important role in increasing the resilience of the dunes by reducing and absorbing wave energy. 	Short- Medium and Long Term activity
ACTIONS	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Continue to measure the dunes from the fixed points as agreed in 1993 with NatureScot. Maintain accurate data records to monitor change. Grow native coastal grasses from seed and plant on eroded dunes to strengthen the dune structure. Remove non-native invasive species from wild and vulnerable areas. Raise public awareness of the importance of dune management. Scotlands Outdoor Access Code. Visitor Management Strategy in place. Action to educate public about wildfires and mitigate against risks. Work with all partners, policy makers and academics. Participate in research and encourage people to understand the changing coastline. PRIORITY	PROTECTING THE NATURAL ENVIRONMENT Promoting Biodiversity and conserving habitats	TIMESCALE/PROGRESS FUNDING
REASONING	<p>Biodiversity loss has now been recognised as a national security issue by the UK Government. It is likely to have a catastrophic impact on many aspects of human existence in years to come. There is a need to do everything possible to reduce negative environmental impacts and help promote biodiversity. Locally, most of our coastal birds are on the red list of species at risk of extinction. Habitat conservation is crucial as East Haven is home to vulnerable protected waders. The Ringed Plover normally nests on the beach between EH and Arbroath but no nests have been seen in the last couple of years. The Curlew, Wheatear and Corn Bunting are also declining and need support to conserve their habitats. Fish and lobster on our section of the east coast are also on the red list. The Small Blue Butterfly is an endangered species and at risk of extinction.</p>	Ongoing
ACTIONS	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pollinator Friendly Plants to be selected for gardens and green spaces • Butterflies and Bees Monthly walks along a 1km designated transect to identify numbers and types of Butterflies and Bees (1st March to end of October). All species data uploaded to Bumblebee Conservation Society and UK Butterfly. • irecord By Dec 2025 East Haven had recorded 600 species of wildlife. Records continue to be uploaded to irecord to maintain knowledge about how species are changing over time. • Species On The Edge (5.5 year project) EHT has undertaken a lot of work to help create a food corridor of kidney vetch along the Angus coast for the Small Blue Butterfly. Kidney Vetch surveys are carried out in East Haven and survey work carried out along the coast. (Nature of Scotland Award award 2018) • Seals Support British Marine Dive Rescue by storing a rescue crate for vulnerable seal pups. • Support Wildlife - Maintaining habitats - monitor impacts - upload species data • Participate in Citizen Science projects such as the ECHO project with the James Hutton Institute (2025). • Maintain coastal dunes and remove non-native invasive species who undermine biodiversity. Environmental damage should as a priority be rectified at source Ensure that polluters bear the cost of pollution control and remediation 	Short, Medium and Long Term
ACTIONS	<p>East Haven Together is a member of the Coastal Communities Network (CCN) and a representative on Scotlands Marine Litter Strategy Steering Group and Marine Litter forum.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Beach cleaning activities are carried out almost everyday. ATV purchased in 2019 to enable EHT to uplift heavy marine litter from an extended area of the Angus coast. Community Led Beach Award from Keep Scotland Beautiful achieved every year since 2015 Marine Conservation Society Surveys carried out and the data uploaded to the MCS portal. EHT volunteers always try to trace marine litter and pollution incidents back to source. e.g. Dowrie Works, Nato War ships and Construction work on NCN1. EHT works to change policy and legislation if this is required to reduce pollution and better protect the marine environment. 	ATV may need replaced within 5 years. It is becoming increasingly expensive to maintain.

REASONING	Water shortages and droughts are increasingly likely in the future. Residents will need to adapt and use more sustainable practices both privately and across the village	Ongoing
ACTIONS	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Conserve and reduce the use of mains water in the community gardens. • Increase capacity of poor sandy soil to retain moisture and nutrients. e.g soil enhancer, leaf mold. • Comprehensive rainwater collection system installed at the Bothy and Resilience shed. Water drains into three butts which have taps for filling watering cans. Water reused in other areas. • Reduce mowing patterns to allow the grass to grow longer and provide more moisture. One person takes responsibility for grass management and advising frequency of cuts to others on the rota. Electric mower used in main gardens. • Future plant choices include: coastal plants which do well in drought conditions e.g Echinacea, Sedum, Catmint, Lavender, Salvia, Hebe, Veronica, Loosestrife.

ACTIONS	<p>Extreme Weather Events - Coastal incidents</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • EHT is a member of the Angus Community Resilience Forum and has a Community Resilience plan in place to mitigate against the impact of the challenges faced by our coastal community. • The charity works in partnership with local and national groups, organisations, and universities • The ATV is on the Community Asset register. Registered Named drivers in the village drive emergency service staff when required. • Continue coastal adaptation plans • Flood gate purchased to protect the underpass at Long Row. • Trailer purchased for ATV to enable the SFRS to transport pumps and other equipment in the event of wild fires. • A range of resilience equipment including pumps and inflatable sand bags have been purchased.
